Marsh grass senescence, WFSU Ecology Blog

From Green to Gold: The Seasonal Change of Coastal Plants

As the weather cools, you may have noticed the once green marsh grasses along the shoreline beginning to fade to golden brown, or the underwater meadows of seagrasses appearing thin. This seasonal shift is called senescence, and is a natural period when plants slow their growth and limit productivity in preparation for the cooler months ahead.

Like trees shedding their leaves, marsh plants and seagrasses prepare for the winter by reducing their growth above ground and instead redirect nutrients to their roots and rhizomes (structures below ground). Seagrasses shed older blades while new ones wait for warmer, sunnier weather before growing. The shedding of old leaves and stems not only helps these plants survive the winter but also supports coastal ecosystems by providing organic material for nutrient cycling, stabilizing sediment, and creating habitat for wildlife.
